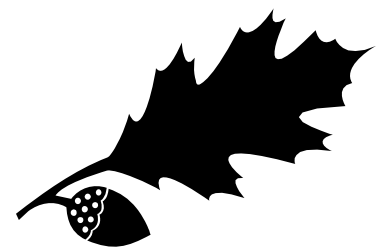
The live auction items included a hunting package, a beautiful oriental rug, a week’s stay in Rockport, a time share condo in Florida, and much more!

Meet RNC'S Volunteer of the Month, Wes Dorman

RNC's Education Committee Does What?

In last month's newsletter we highlighted our Education Committee's efforts at Riverside regarding our educational programming. We actually ran out of space before we could finish, so this is the last bit of information regarding our youth programs.

Each summer for the past 4 years, Riverside offers summer day camps to students in the 3rd through the 7th grades. We have a lot of competition in the area, as you probably already know, so we are trying to offer unique opportunities that are educational. They last for 5-6 days from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. usually from Monday through Friday.

One camp we offer is called Photography Camp. Angelo & Donna Falzarano offer a week of instructional, yet fun activities that teach students about how a camera functions as well as how to take successful photographs of nature-related subjects. By the end of the week, students have actually created their own scrapbook of photos taken while at camp. It's lots of fun, encourages creativity, gets kids to really observe nature, and it is very educationally oriented because Donna's a certified teacher!





Another camp we offer is called Nature Adventure Camp. This is one camp that changes a great deal from teacher to teacher. The main goal is to teach students about nature via several different venues. Sometimes we go down to the river to see what lives near and in the water. Sometimes we learn about what good habitats must have to be successful, and then we go out on the grounds to find real habitats. This year we even created a habitat with what was found on the ground (meaning nothing live was used)! Sometimes we play games, but there is always a purpose for them—i.e., getting acquainted, developing skills of cooperation, developing problem solving skills, and the like. Sometimes we do artistic activities because nature and creativity go together like peanut butter and jelly! Here again, we play while we learn!



Finally, the last camp we have been developing for the last 3 years is one we call Wilderness Skills Camp. This camp has been very well received by students and parents alike. The main purpose of the camp is as the name infers—teaching survival skills. This includes learning some basic first aide techniques (like how to handle a snake bite), learning orienteering skills (how to find your way in rough, hilly terrain), how to set up a tent, how to build a campfire, and especially how to leave a site looking as though no one had ever been there. Parts of this camp involve going to the Kerrville-Schreiner City Park, and the staff there has been most cooperative and helpful—all to the benefit of our campers!

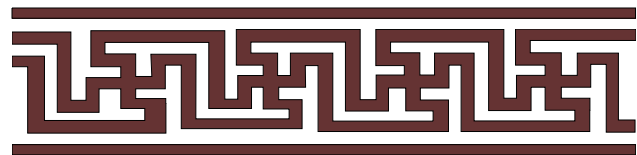
